combination therapy than fluoxetine therapy, CBT only, or placebo, though SI was lower than baseline in all conditions At 36 weeks, suicidal events were more common in patients treated with fluoxetine alone (147%), compared to 84% for combination and 63% for CBT alone (March et al, 2004; 2007)
