1625, James I's government was corrupted, foreign relations deteriorated rapidly, and England teetered on the brink of war with Spain once again James' son and heir, Charles I, faced even greater financial difficulties Dependent upon Parliament for grants, Charles attempted to earn money through forced loans and unpopular taxes

in England was 33% 50-60 % were engaged in some skilled craft or trade before leaving England Less than one third were directly employed in agriculture Washing was uncommon amongst these people Charles Francis Adams (1807-1886), son of John Quincy Adams, recalled that there were no baths in the town of Quincy for two hundred years
