Each child's way of learning a new language should be viewed as acceptable, logical, and part of the ongoing development and learning of any new language. Defining the problem: At younger and younger ages, children are negotiating difficult transitions between their home and educational settings, requiring an adaptation to two or more diverse sets.

Young children Develop in an environment of relationships

Understanding of emotions, commitment, morality, and other aspects of human development. Sensitive and responsive parent-child relationships also are associated with stronger cognitive skills in young children. Young children are highly vulnerable to emotional trauma.

Young children's understanding of the world is organized through the most primitive parts of the brain that are highly sensitive to stress. Trauma in childhood leads to neural pathways being established in the brain that are highly responsive to threat.
